

Sermon-Based Bible Study July 20, 2025

"Action" - #4 in the series The Influence of Jesus

Texts (NIV): John 20:19-22

- 1. "Lights! Camera! Action!" Imagine an excited director shouting these words as she cues everyone on stage that the moment has finally come the moment when all their lines have been rehearsed, all the props are in place, the lights are set, and it's time for action, time to film the scene.
 - Facing a moment of action can be daunting, sometimes fearful.
 - Think about a time when you've been called on to take action it could be in a personal situation or one that involved a professional decision.
 - How did being at a point of taking action make you feel?
 - What considerations influenced how you responded in that moment of taking action?

2. Read John 20:19-20.

Fearing the Jewish leaders because they had been followers of Jesus, the disciples had locked themselves in a room when the resurrected Jesus suddenly appeared to them.

- What emotions might the disciples have been experiencing as they were gathered in that room?
- How does Jesus demonstrate that he understands their fears and their need to be assured?

3. Read John 20: 21-22.

Jesus' message may not have been what they were expecting - a message about being sent out to do God's work.

- How significant is it that Jesus spoke the words, "Peace be with you," a second time?
- Why would it have been important for the disciples to know they were being sent in the same way God had sent Jesus into the world?
- How do you respond to the image of Jesus breathing the Holy Spirit into the disciples as part of sending them into action?
- Have you ever been aware of the direct presence of the Holy Spirit in a work God sent you to do?
- 4. Consider experiences or opportunities you have had when someone or something has called you to take action.
 - What was most challenging about that experience?
 - O What did the action look like?
 - How did being sent for action in this situation intersect with your faith journey?
- 5. How can we pray for you?
